RYLIE AND ABBY

OUR 2022 CHAMPION CHILDREN

In 2009, on her 3rd birthday, Rylie was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (Pre-B). After successfully receiving treatment at the Jimmy Everest Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders (JECC), Rylie continues to be an inspiration to her family and friends, especially to her little sister Abby. Seven years after Rylie's diagnosis, she noticed a lump on the neck of her sister, Abby. The team at the JECC diagnosed Abby with Ganglioneuroblastoma, an intermediate tumor that arises from nerve tissues. After opting out of chemotherapy treatment, the surgeon removed 80% of the tumor. Rylie, sixteen years old, and Abby, eight years old, are both sharing their stories to help raise money to fund pediatric cancer research and help find a cure for childhood cancer.

BRANDON WEEDEN ANNUAL GOLF TOURNAMENT FOR PEDIATRIC CARDIAC SURGERY

Brandon and Melanie Weeden hosted the 12th Annual Brandon Weeden "Swing from the Heart" Golf Challenge on June 23, 2022. The event was held at the prestigious Karsten Creek Golf Club in Stillwater, Oklahoma. Brandon Weeden and his wife, Melanie, have witnessed firsthand the challenges for Oklahoma's children in need of cardiac care through their friendship with the family of twelve-year-old Gavin. The Weedens created their foundation to endow a chair in pediatric cardiac surgery at Children's Hospital. This endowment is creating research and financial resources that will help Children's Hospital continue to grow its already prominent program. Through personal resources and your help, the Weeden's are able to continue to grow this endowment.

This year's event was presented by Devon Energy and raised more than \$140,000 for the Pediatric Cardiac Surgery Program. In addition, they are participating in groundbreaking research allowing them to help lead the way in the treatment of pediatric cardiac surgery.

OKLAHOMA CATTLEMEN'S ASSOCIATION RANCH RODEO

The Children's Health Foundation has been the selected charity since 1997. In that time, OCA has donated more than \$585,000 to CHF to help fund children's medical research and treatment for children right here at home in Oklahoma.



With matching funds, Moore Kiwanis was able to contribute a total of \$26,724.00 to the Diabetes Program from the Cars For Cures event.

TINKER CAR SHOW

Every year, Tinker Federal Credit Union does so many great things for Children's Health Foundation through their Children's Miracle Network, Credit Unions for Kids program. In May of 2022, they hosted their 22nd Miracle Car Show. This year, they raised \$30,000. This annual event draws collectors of custom and modified vehicles from nearly every era. We will celebrate and honor the legacy of Patricia Price Browne and her tireless work for children at the Patricia Price Browne Prize Dinner on May 16, 2023 and a lecture on May 17, 2023. The Patricia Price Browne Prize in Biomedical Ethics is the only prize of its kind in the nation and 2023 marks the eighth presentation of the prize. Children's Health Foundation is extremely grateful to the Browne family for the establishment of the Patricia Price Browne Prize and the Patricia Price Browne Distinguished Chair in Pediatrics. These efforts provide national leadership in the important area of medical ethics.

Every two years, the University of Oklahoma recognizes and awards a \$10,000 prize to a national or international health care professional who demonstrates outstanding ethical qualities in confronting the critical medical ethics issues of the day. Representatives of Patricia's friends, along with health care professionals, participate in the selection of the prize winner. This year's recipient to receive the prize

is Ezekiel Emmanuel, Ph.D., MD. Dr. Emmanuel is the Vice Provost for Global Initiatives, Chair of the Department of Medical Ethics and Health Policy and the Diane v.S. Levy and Robert M. Levy University Professor at the Perelman School of Medicine and The Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania.

2022 MIRACLE MAKER AWARD WINNER



Amy Middleman, M.D., MSEd, MPH, CHF Kasterke/Griggs/ McLaughlin Chair - Adolescent Medicine was honored with the 2022 Vaughn Rickert Vaccine Research Award from the Society for Adolescent Health and Medicine (SAHM) in June 2022. Dr. Middleman, Medical Director of the Adolescent Medicine Clinic and Chief of Adolescent Medicine Section, was recognized for her publication, "Vaccines for Teens: Attitudes Across the Pandemic on Routine and COVID-19 Vaccines." Before passing away unexpectedly in 2015, Dr. Vaughn Rickert was a well-known clinical psychologist and past president of SAHM committed to increasing the rates of adolescent vaccinations through research and advocacy. His namesake award recognizes the toprated abstract submission focused on vaccination research. Dr. Middleman leads the Disordered Eating Program in the Adolescent Medicine Section at OU Children's Physicians and collaborates with specialty-trained physicians, dietitians, mental health professionals and others providing comprehensive and collaborative care to young people between the ages of 10and 23-years seeking care for adolescent-specific issues. CHF CHOCTAW NATION ENDOWED CHAIRHOLDER RECEIVES GRANT FROM THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF DIABETES AND DIGESTIVE AND KIDNEY DISEASES.



This past July, a research team led by our very own CHF Choctaw Nation Chair, Dr. Kevin Short, Ph.D. received a 2.3 million dollar grant awarded by the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases. Dr. Short and his team have been researching the rapidly increasing rates of nonalcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD) in children driven mainly by the growing obesity epidemic. With this grant, Dr. Short and his team will aim to better understand the development of NAFLD in younger age ranges and hopefully discover new biomarkers to hopefully be used in monitoring treatments. Dr. Short is an associate professor in the Department of Pediatrics at the OU College of Medicine and serves as one of the Children's Health Foundation's beloved endowed chairs. We are thrilled for him and his team to have received this award in order to continue to further pediatric medicine and can't wait to see the impact made by their research in order to provide the utmost care to Oklahoma's children.

EMERGENCY MEDICINE



The Emergency Medicine Mentor Program, chaired by our CHF Express Employment International Chair, Dr. Amanda Bogie, welcomed 36 students this past semester in research training opportunities. The Emergency Medicine Mentor Program is a new mentorship program aimed at introducing junior and senior undergraduates to medical research and possible careers in research. These select students were chosen based upon their GPA, earned credit hours, and their written responses in the OUPEMRAP application about their interests and future career goals. The Stanton L. Young Family Foundation makes this program possible through a generous grant that provides these students with the skills and resources in order to further their educations and soon go onto improve medicine for the kids of Oklahoma and across the world. When asked about the program, Dr. Bogie stated "It is my great pleasure to work with these young students. This program gives the students the tools they need to move into the direction of research. Over the course of the semester, each student receives 60 hours of in-person training in the Emergency Department in

addition to mentorship meetings and weekly lectures, which they would not have had without this grant." We are thrilled by Dr. Bogie and The Young Family Foundation for all they do in furthering pediatric medicine to ensure the best care for Oklahoma's kids.
